

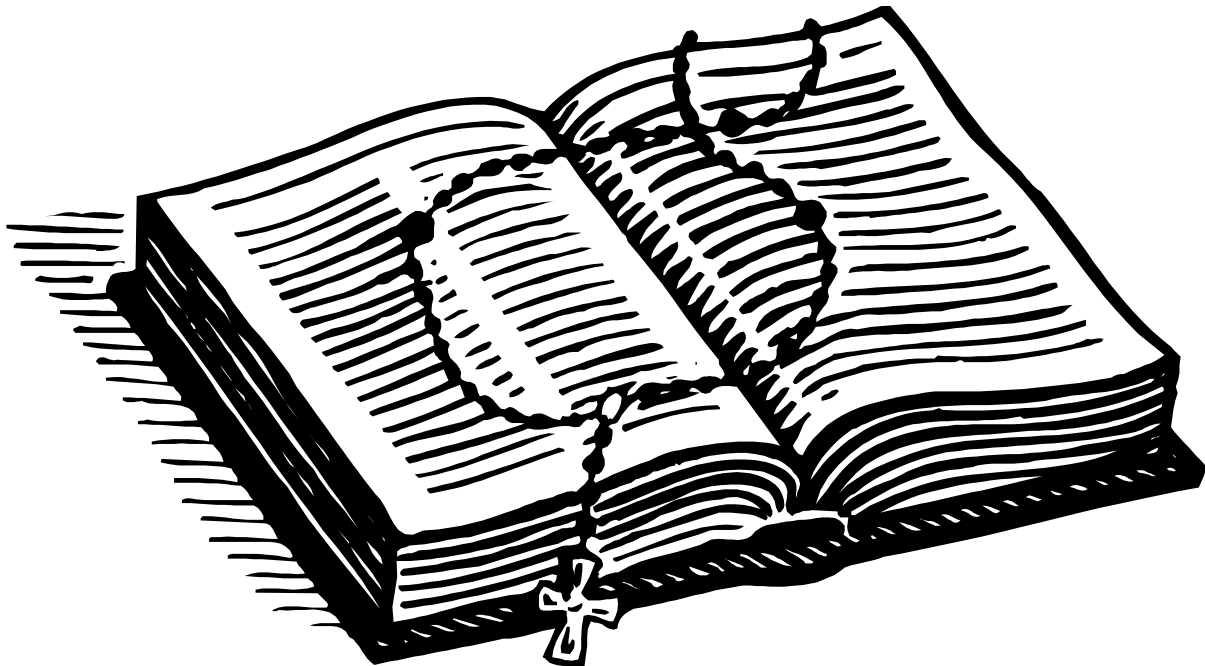

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

THE ROLE OF PARENTS/GUARDIANS

The church teaches that parents have the privilege and responsibility of being the primary educator of the faith of their children. This education and formation in faith occurs in many ways: by modeling faith in daily actions, by modeling good moral judgments, by sharing regular family prayer times, by attending Sunday Mass as a family.

The religious education (hereafter referred to as RE) program can only reinforce what is taught and modeled in the home. If interest in and encouragement for the RE program is shown in the home, then students will have that same enthusiasm for their faith, and will come to classes willingly.

During the brief time catechists have students for class, it is not possible to teach everything about our faith, or to help them learn all their prayers. Therefore it is essential that parents work with their children at home to learn these things, and that there be dialogue between parents and children regarding what is being learned in the RE classroom.

The support of parents is evident in an all-encompassing way when they volunteer to help as a catechist, a classroom aid, a hall monitor, a traffic controller, or an office assistant. Please consider offering time in this way as an added support for the children.

THE CATECHIST

The church believes that parents are the primary educators of their children. To aid them in this work, the catechist is to “echo the Good News.” The Good News is the message of Jesus as expressed through the Catholic Church, prayer, and worship, community with each other and within the parish, and service to all peoples. Catechists help lead the children to grow in their faith and relationship with Christ in the church.

Toward this end, catechists strive to become “faith-filled, spiritually formed, trained, and competent in the skills of catechesis at the level they are working. Catechists in Catholic school and catechetical programs are to be practicing Catholics, because it is important to witness to a lived faith. Catechists are to be given ongoing in-service and formation opportunities which lead to an endorsement from the Office of Catechetical Services.”

DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The director of religious education (hereafter referred to as DRE) is a catechetical leader and an administrator of the parish elementary religious education (hereafter referred to as RE) program. The DRE collaborates with the pastor and other parish ministers in setting policies which pertain to faith formation, and in the planning and implementing of Generations of Faith.

The DRE is responsible for designing the elementary RE program of the parish, for supervising catechists and providing formation and in-service for them, for overseeing the sacramental preparation of those in religious education, and for collaborating with the appropriate personnel at Resurrection school site in the immediate preparations and planning of the liturgical celebrations of the sacraments. The DRE is primarily accountable to the pastor and also works in collaboration with the faith formation committee and according to their policies.

FAITH FORMATION COMMITTEE

The parish faith formation committee is responsible for enabling the development of faith of all parishioners. Toward this end, it assists in establishing goals for total faith formation, implementing and evaluating programs, and setting policies which accord with those of the archdiocese.

GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES

Calendar Changes

If the calendar is changed, parents will receive written notice with their child and/or a notice will be placed in the parish Sunday bulletin.

Cancellation of classes

If school is cancelled, or if there is early dismissal due to inclement weather, religious education classes are automatically cancelled. Local media stations will be notified of these or other cancellations. If possible, the DRE will also send e-mail notifications.

Arrival and Dismissal

It is imperative that all parents/guardians are familiar with the traffic policy for RE classes. It is essential that everyone follow the procedures in the parking lots, as well as the policy of escorting children in order to ensure their safety. Please remind them to walk cautiously as they enter and exit the building. For their safety, they are required to **walk** in corridors and classrooms. Adults: Please drive slowly in the parking lots.

For their safety, students may not be in any classroom before the catechist arrives. After students are admitted to the room, the catechist is responsible for their supervision. **Students are expected to conduct themselves in a respectful and courteous manner.**

Written permission is needed for a student to leave a class early must be given to the catechist, who will forward the note to the DRE.

Attendance

Attendance at programs and classes is essential to develop a sense of belonging to the parish community, to foster growth in each student's relationship with God, and for an ongoing understanding of Catholic faith. Parental attendance at scheduled meetings and/or RE Mass is expected. Weekly attendance at Sunday Mass, as well as at Masses on Holy Days of Obligation, is also expected for the spiritual nourishment of the child and the whole family.

Notification of absence from an RE class should be made to the DRE before the beginning of the student's scheduled class time. We will contact families regarding absent students if we are not notified prior to class. If absence continues to be a problem, a meeting with the parents, the student, and the DRE will be arranged. In special circumstances, i.e. long term illness, a serious accident, or personal family situation, communication with the DRE is required to maintain contact and relationship with the student.

Discipline

The DRE, catechists, aides, and parent volunteers are responsible for maintaining good discipline. Within the classroom, normal discipline problems will be handled by the classroom catechist. If there are serious or recurring problems, the policy on discipline will be implemented (see below).

Special Needs

Parents are requested to list any health concerns or learning disabilities of their child on the registration form. This information will be communicated to the appropriate catechists.

Communications

During the year there will be regular written communications to parents from catechists and/or the DRE. Communication from the DRE will primarily be via e-mail, unless an address is not provided by the parents/guardians. To be added to the e-mail contact list, contact the DRE. Written communications will ordinarily be sent home with the youngest member of the family, who will be responsible to deliver these to parents. Mutual and ongoing communication between catechists and parents is highly recommended, but parents are encouraged to contact the catechists or the DRE particularly if a problem develops.

Property

Respect for each person's property and for school and parish property is expected in every area of the school. Food and gum are not allowed in any classroom or building, unless the food is part of the class program and has the permission of the catechist. Personal belongings that disrupt the classroom procedure will be collected by the catechist and returned to the student after class.

Appropriate Dress

Because it reflects one's attitude toward other persons and the activity, appropriate dress is necessary for RE classes.

Emergency Calls

Only necessary calls will be made, and these require the permission and assistance of the DRE. All calls made by a student will be made from the RE office. The use of cell phones in class is not permitted.

Articles Found may be claimed in the RE office upon proper identification.

Prayer

Prayer is an essential part of all classes, programs, or gatherings. Students will also have the opportunity to attend Mass and to receive the sacrament of reconciliation during the year. Parents are expected to be familiar with and to help children learn the prayers appropriate for each grade (see Prayers, Beliefs, and Practices below) and to integrate prayer into the lives of their children.

Sacramental Preparation

Students who will receive the sacraments of reconciliation and Eucharist for the first time, together with their parents, are expected to attend sacramental preparation meetings or events as scheduled. It is Dubuque city policy for students to receive sacraments in their own parish.

Transportation devices

Shoes with wheels (Heelys), roller-skates/blades, skate boards, scooters, and other transportation devices are not allowed to be used in the school. Heelys may only be worn with the wheel removed.

Continuous Enrollment Requirement

An education in our Catholic faith is not only for the young; we are called to a lifetime of learning, young and aged. Furthermore, each sacrament involves preparation. In preparation for confirmation, students are expected to have participated in continuous faith formation and education throughout their elementary and junior high school years.

POLICY ON DISCIPLINE

The respect and dignity of all persons is valued. Appropriate discipline helps all students because it contributes to a climate of learning, loving, and living. It helps each individual because it provides an environment in which to become a self-disciplined person.

Discipline problems are minimized if there are classroom guidelines and goals for learning. Each catechist will establish these, share them with the DRE, and then post them for the students. Having goals and offering positive reinforcement encourages students to choose appropriate behavior.

Normal discipline problems are to be handled by the classroom catechist. If there are recurrent or serious problems, the catechist discusses the situation with the DRE, who will, if necessary, implement the following procedure:

1. Refer the student to the RE office where the student will fill out a discipline form. The student and the DRE will discuss what would have been more appropriate behavior.
2. After the student and the DRE sign the discipline form, the student returns to class. After class, the DRE gives the form to the catechist to sign, and the student takes it home to obtain the signature of a parent/guardian.
3. The DRE will notify the parents/guardian of the disciplinary action.
4. Discipline forms will be filed in the RE office for the year. If a student has two forms on file, a conference will be held with the parents/guardian, the student, the catechist, and the DRE.
5. A mutual agreement of all the parties may involve some form of punishment.
6. If it should occur that any student is referred to the DRE on subsequent occasions, more grave but appropriate action will be taken, determined on an individual basis.

POLICY FOR THE PROTECTION OF MINORS

INTRODUCTION

Prayer, Beliefs, and Practices

The following Prayers, Beliefs and Practices are found in the *Compendium - Catechism of the Catholic Church* ©2006 and the *United States Catholic Catechism for Adults* ©2006. Prayers are organized from the most foundational to more complex; Belief and Practices are alphabetized. The Prayers, Beliefs and Practices have been subdivided into the grades in which it is recommended that they are to be taught. While there is no definitive statement which assigns the Prayers, Beliefs and Practices to the various grade levels, the Prayers, Beliefs and Practices coincide with suggestions and recommendations as presented in “*By Their Fruits You Shall Know Them. . .*” (NCEA) and *Sowing the Seeds of Faith* (NCCL) which reflect developmentally-appropriate levels.

This entire listing is also consistent with the following publications of the Archdiocese of Dubuque: the Catholic school religion standards/grade level expectations developed by the Office of Catholic Schools and the Basic Elements of Catholic Faith from the Office of Catechetical Services.

While other prayers of cultural/liturgical significance may be recommended and used as designated by the local site, students are expected to have an understanding of the Prayers, Beliefs and Practices contained herein, and they will be part of prayer in the school and religious education programs.

PRAYERS

Sign of the Cross

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Our Father/The Lord's Prayer

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us, and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Hail Mary

Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed are thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Glory Be

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning is now, and ever shall be world without end. Amen. (traditional wording)

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen. (found in the Liturgy of the Hours)

Angel of God

Angel of God, my guardian dear, to whom God's love commits me here, ever this day be at my side, to light and guard, to rule and guide. Amen.

Grace Before a Meal

Bless us, O Lord, and these thy gifts, which we are about to receive from thy bounty, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Grace After a Meal

We give thee thanks, for all thy benefits, Almighty God, who live and reign for ever. Amen.

Morning Prayer (younger children)

God, my Father, I give you today all that I think and do and say. I'll work and study, have fun and pray. Jesus be with me all through the day. Amen.

Morning Offering

O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works, joys and sufferings of this day for all the intentions of your Sacred Heart, in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world, for the salvation of souls, the reparation for sins, the reunion of all Christians, and in particular for the intentions of the Holy Father this month. Amen.

Act of Contrition

My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy. Amen.

Jesus Prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, have mercy on me, a sinner.

Confiteor

I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters that I have sinned through my own fault, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and what I have failed to do. And I ask Blessed Mary, ever Virgin, all the angels and saints, and you my brothers and sisters, to pray for me to the Lord our God. May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins and bring us to life everlasting. Amen.

Apostles' Creed

I believe in God the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell; the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and sits at the right hand of God the Father Almighty, from thence He shall come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. Amen.

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, one in Being with the Father. Through Him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation He came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit He was born of the Virgin Mary, and became Man. For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate; He suffered, died, and was buried. On the third day He rose again in fulfillment of the Scriptures; He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His Kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord the Giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Rosary

How to Pray the Rosary:

1. Make the Sign of the Cross.
2. Holding the Crucifix, say the Apostles' Creed.
3. On the first bead, say an Our Father.
4. Say three Hail Marys on each of the next three beads. Say the Glory Be.
5. Go to the main part of the rosary. For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery, then say the Our Father. While fingering each of the ten beads of the decade, say ten Hail Marys while meditating on the Mystery. Then say a Glory Be.
6. Announce the second Mystery and continue in the same way until each of the five Mysteries of the selected group or decades is said.
7. After saying the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen.

Hail, Holy Queen

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To you do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To you do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, your eyes of mercy toward us, and after this exile show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Pray for us O holy Mother of God. R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ our Lord.

Act of Faith

O my God, I firmly believe that you are one God in three divine Persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I believe that your divine Son became man and died for our sins and that he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe these and all the truths which the Holy Catholic Church teaches because you have revealed them who are eternal truth and wisdom, who can neither deceive nor be deceived. In this faith I intend to live and die. Amen.

Act of Hope

O Lord God, I hope by your grace for the pardon of all my sins and after life here to gain eternal happiness because you have promised it who are infinitely powerful, faithful, kind, and merciful. In this hope I intend to live and die. Amen.

Act of Love

O Lord God, I love you above all things and I love my neighbor for your sake because you are the highest, infinite and perfect good, worthy of all my love. In this love I intend to live and die. Amen.

Memorare

Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known, that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thy intercession, was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my Mother. To thee do I come, before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hear and answer me. Amen.

Angelus

V. The angel of the Lord declared unto Mary.

R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary . . .

V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord.

R. Be it done to me according to thy word. Hail, Mary . . .

V. And the Word was made flesh,

R. And dwelt among us. Hail, Mary . . .

V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God,

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

BELIEFS AND PRACTICES

FORMULAS OF CATHOLIC DOCTRINE

Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-12)

- Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.
- Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.
- Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.
- Blessed are the clean of heart (or pure of heart), for they will see God.
- Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.
- Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness (or righteousness' sake), for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven.

Communion Regulations

- As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently.
- In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should be conscious of no grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour.
- A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (CIC, can. 916).
- A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

Communion Fast

- We are expected to fast from food or drink for at least one hour prior to the reception of Holy Communion.

Four Gospels

Regulations for Fast and Abstinence

- Fasting is refraining from food or drink to some degree.
- Abstinence is refraining from eating meat.
- In the United States, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence, and all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.
- The obligation to abstain from meat binds all Catholics 14 years of age and older. The obligation to fast, limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals in the course of a day, binds Catholics from the ages of 21 to 59.
